Rather than attempt to co-ordinate everyone's requirements, we will leave it to Chapters and individuals to book their own. A good place to start your search is Google Maps. If you enter the search words 'Auckland' 'CBD' and 'accommodation' you will get a good picture of what is available and an approximation of cost at each place. (Hover over the cost label and simple details of the accommodation provider will be revealed.)

Enter 'Victory Convention Centre' to see where it is on the map.

If you look for Directions from a possible accommodation provider to the Victory Convention Centre and select the pedestrian icon, it will not only show you the distance and time to walk the route but also a pictorial representation of any hills you may encounter.



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Will there be a Convention Headquarters Hotel?

The Māori Language for Visitors

The three languages used in New Zealand are English, Māori and Sign Language.

We thought you may enjoy finding out a little about the Māori language, or as they call in Māori, Te Reo Māori. You will see it in many place names, and if you need to ask for directions, it helps if you can say place names correctly. And it is fun to give it a go.

Let's start with some vowel sounds. The Māori pronunciations of the vowels written in English as a - e - i - o - u are: ah - eh - ee - or - oo. In other words:

a is like the 'u' in cup e is like the 'e' in egg i is like the 'e' in eat o is like the 'o' in for u is like the 'o' in to.

(When it comes to diphthongs, where there are two vowels joined together in a place like Marahau, it works on that same principle with ah-oo... just speed them up to join them together and it sounds like an oh.)

A macron over the vowels: $\bar{a} - \bar{e} - \bar{i} - \bar{o} - \bar{u}$ lengthens them. So that gives you:

 \bar{a} is like the 'a' in car \bar{e} is like the 'ea' in measure \bar{i} is like the 'ee' in heel \bar{o} is like the 'ou' in your \bar{u} is like the 'oo' in roof.

And a couple of extra sounds to help say some words:

'ng' is like the 'ng' in singer 'wh' is like the 'f' in father



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Try saying "Ngāruawāhia" (a place near Hamilton in the Waikato region). And "Whenuapai" (an airfield near Auckland). Yay! Nailed it!
